He also had terrible scars from a nose string that a previous owner had used.

We fixed his haematoma & patched his scars.
A very relieved little donkey!



Sunlight

Poor Sunlight had terrible wounds from the cruel bridles her owners had used.



With a lot of love and attention from us, we were able to heal her wounds, educate her owners and send her home.



Sooty

Sooty came in with festering wounds that were full of maggots.

After a lovely long rest with us, she left happy, whole, and with newly educated owners about how to take better care of her!



Honey

When Honey came in, he had a fractured splint bone, plus a massive abscess which ruptured.

We packed the abscess with honey and gave him antibiotics and pain killers. *He's nearly fully recovered now!*



Lucky

When Lucky came in, he had massive swelling due to being accidentally stabbed by a kebab skewer! After emergency treatment and lots of rest, he made a full recovery. We also gave his owner a new, donated halter & nose band that were much more gentle.



Poor Boy

Old cans had been beaten into shape, then nailed to Poor Boy's feet.

As a result, his feet had started to rot and he was in agony every time he stood up.

After our farriers fixed his feet, and spending a lot of time resting, *he made a full recovery.*



Carter

She was scared by a passing truck while pulling a cart.

She bolted but the shafts of the cart gouged her legs, causing terrible damage to her tendons & a fracture in one leg. We were able to treat the wounds to control the infection & are hoping for a full recovery.



Hulk

Hulk named for his size and gentle nature came to us on the back of a truck in a very awkward position all the way from Harem Giza. He had a ten day old puncture wound and was in terrible pain. The 'horsecrocs' had arrived just in time and we were able to use them straight away.



Princess Holly

Holly is very special to EEA. She had been so badly abused but still had a beautiful nature. Horrible pics were posted of her being treated roughly along with comments about her being aggressive and dangerous! *Her wounds have healed and she has put on weight.*



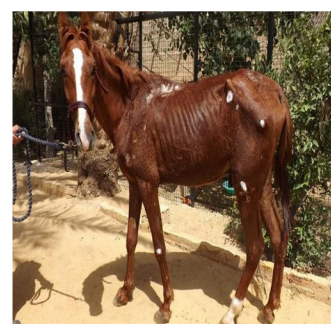
Little Man

Hero

Hero came to EEA with an infected neck wound. It was touch and go for a while but Hero never gave up. His courage, honesty and patience is what gets me through his treatments every day. *He now has a funny looking neck but has made a full recovery!*



Egypt

Egypt never gave up and became stronger every day. He will go on to become one of Egypt's first ever Equine Therapy horses & *we couldn't be prouder.*



Feisty The Foal

Feisty did not have the best luck from day one. On the day of her birth she fell down a well and tore up the skin on all four legs. Luckily she was bought to EEA for treatment. *She truly lived up to her name, Feisty*, and it often required several people to assist in a bandage change.



Arab

Arab was a cheeky boy that tried to jump a marble table which resulted in a large laceration on his leg. With our new x-ray machine, we were able to check for any fractures. Bandaging the wound proved quite difficult due to the location but *Arab is now the fashionista of EEA*.



Kebab

Nicknamed Kebab after being punctured by a Kebab Skewer. He has huge swelling which will need time to reduce as well as pain killers & antibiotics to prevent infection. Unfortunately, there is an Egypt wide shortage of tetanus anti-toxin so all we can do is cross our fingers & hope for the best!



Jabari

When Jabari was bought to EEA, Jill could see clear signs of animal abuse. His tail and ears had been cut off and he was covered in wounds. Jill made sure Jabari could stay at EEA, and he is now going on to bigger and better things. *Jabari will be Egypt's first Equine Therapy Donkey!*



Orchitis

This poor horse had collapsed in the street, and the owner called for help, so we got him back to EEA. He is suffering with Orchitis (infection or inflammation in the testes) which can sometimes cause colic. This is not an easy thing to treat but we are doing everything we can for the poor boy.

Prevention is often the best cure. Alby is lucky to have a good owner that brings him in regularly for treatment. Regular medications like worming are often an expense the owners can't afford. His owner looks after him well and takes advantage of all the preventative treatments offered.



Lollie

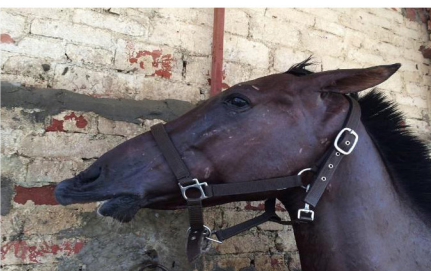
Lollie was burnt in a 'barn' fire some weeks ago. She is such a darling and has remained so sweet and agreeable throughout her treatments.

Mabrooka was one of EEA's first patients. She was brought to EEA with shredded knees after falling down from pulling a cart that was too heavy.
